To be synodal

The cry of the Earth and cry of the poor are most deeply felt in the peripheral communities of Oceania and Asia. Large Ocean States are experiencing sea-level rise, seabed mining, and extreme weather events. Similarly in Asia, climate events impact vulnerable communities that continue to see destruction in the forests, coastal areas, and the greater biodiversity that sustain all our lives. These concerns are interconnected by way of the "river above" - "the Pacific Ocean is the life, the river of Asia feeding all rivers, seasons and lives. This flow is life-giving and life-taking, especially as the climate is changing and resources are being exhausted." Addressing these concerns will only be possible if Oceania and Asia act together. Seeking to renew our vision and commitment towards a Church that listens and dialogues, RAOEN aims to listen to the voices of Synodality for Oceania and Asia. Pope Francis emphasizes the value of Synodality as key for the Church in the Future. Synodality literally means "walking together", referring to "involvement and participation of the whole People of God in the life and mission of the Church" (SLMC 7). RAOEN in collaboration with FABC, FCBCO, Global Alliance of Ecclesial Network, Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development, and Caritas aims to create a space for synodality through this dialogue between local voices and Church and ecumenical leaders. The hope is to strengthen collaborations and commitments amongst these groups grounded on the common desire to care for the oceans and forests.



Listening to our Youth: Caritas Oceania Laudato Si' Youth Forum

To celebrate Laudato Si' Week 2022, the Caritas Oceania Youth Alliance hosted a Caritas Oceania Laudato Si' Youth Forum which provided the space and opportunity for young people across Oceania to come together to discuss their particular concerns as well as share their ideas for action to care for our common home. The Forum focused on the theme "Heart, Head and Hands" and consisted of three daily webinars that ran from 24th-26th May, 2022, each day focusing on one aspect of the theme. The young people of Oceania have recognised the urgent need to take action and to work towards ecological justice, and so hosting the Laudato Si' Youth Forum was a great way to come together to discuss the issues we each are facing in our respective island nations and to share our ideas on how to address these issues and better care for creation.

How do we honor the knowledge and wisdom of local communities and Indigenous Peoples in caring for Creation? Interfaith Dialogue is a way to connect FORESTS, WATER AND PEOPLE. Catholics may only be 3% of the region's population yet being part of the local culture gives us an opportunity for accompanying and responding to the most in need.

The Forum was the first event that was hosted collaboratively by the Caritas Oceania Youth Alliance Directors and Bishops were

invited and encouraged to extend the invitation to their own networks, and promotional material was also posted on various social media platforms in the weeks leading up to the Forum. In total, we received 89 registrations for the event and an average of 50 people attending on each day. There was plenty of stories and learnings that were shared and these discussions reflected the mutual desire to address the environmental issues across Oceania and the importance of working together and individually to achieve this.

Following the footsteps of REPAM in the Pan-Amazonian region and inspired by the Synod on the Amazon that draws from Pope Francis' orientations given in Laudato Si' and Querida Amazonia, the Church in Oceania and Asia is forwarding a network of organisations showing humanity the way forward in the present socioecological crises.




The River Above is created! As global warming exacerbates the impacts of La Niña, current ecological problems worsen and the risk of greater instability and vulnerability increases.
